On June 17, 2005, a meeting was held at the Cambridge Suites in Sydney as a part of the Historic Sites and Monument Board of Canada New Sites Initiative in Women's History. Anne Marie Lane Jonah met with a small group of local historians and interested parties to work on preparing letters of nomination to the HSMBC regarding women's history.

The local participants were eager to draft nomination letters but felt they needed guidance in the process. The meeting also provided an important opportunity to network for those interested in women's history in Cape Breton. Nominating letters are being prepared for Holy Angels School in Sydney, Sister Margaret Beaton, Marie Marguerite Rose - a slave at Louisbourg, and Katherine McLennan.

As well information is being gathered on the tradition of making hooked rugs in various parts of Cape Breton with the plan to draft a letter in cooperation with interested parties in Chéticamp later this year. The process from submitting a letter with a proposal for nomination to hearing the Board's decision normally takes about two years.

# News from AGB

Excerpt from letter from Mrs. Alexander Graham Bell to Mrs. Alexander Melville Bell (her mother-in-law) written in Baddeck, July 21st, 1887.

My dear Mrs. Bell:

Alec says that he did not forget the 19th but that I would not let him go into town to telegraph ... How is it that you and Mr. Bell always remember these occasions? I wish I knew the secret for I am grieved and mortified when I forget. Isn't it too bad both Alec and I forgot our own wedding day, and Alec spent the time from early dawn until late in the evening fishing at Middle River eight miles away. Papa's telegram reached late at night and that was our first reminder.

It is perfectly lovely here and Alec is happy and busy all day long, rowing, fishing or working in his kitchen garden. His arms have grown so strong now that he can row all day long without fatigue ... Alec is full of plans for his place, and so well and vigorous it would please you to see him, and he is longing to show himself and his home to you and his father. Your room is ready for you whenever you will come and we want you very much. Alec, Mr Sumichrast, Mr. Kiezel and Mr. McCurdy have gone to Margaree for a couple of days fishing and hope to bring home a salmon. I am rather glad he is away for it gives me a chance to get my house in order, a pretty difficult feat with him around.

... Goodnight. I find weeding in the kitchen garden steadily for nearly four

hours this afternoon has left me tired and quite ready for bed. Come soon and see how nice everything here is.
