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SAFETY IS OUR RESPONSIBILITY

Here are a few tips to follow to help you take your safety responsibilities seriously. Take it upon yourself to:

► Be fully knowledgeable and comply with rules and procedures, as well as the applicable federal, provincial and municipal regulations or other relevant codes and standards;

► perform your duties in a manner that will not cause injury to yourself or endanger your own life or the lives of fellow employees and members of the general public;

► report and correct, if possible, all unsafe acts and conditions observed and make recommendations that would eliminate such hazards;

► wear approved personal protective equipment when working in hazardous areas;

► refuse to initiate a work procedure or operate equipment when there is a definite reason to believe that to do so would create a danger to your own health and safety or the safety of a coworker;

► assist fellow employees with understanding and following safe work practices and complying with our health and safety program;

► promptly report to your supervisor all work-related injuries and visits to a doctor for work-related problems;

► maintain good housekeeping in each work area;

► promptly notify your supervisor when equipment needs repair or replacement;

► maintain a proper state of physical and mental fitness prior to the performance of assigned duties and tasks and leave the premises or place of employment if your ability to work safely is hindered or impaired.

News from AGB

In the days leading up to the formalization of the "Aerial Experiment Association" on October 1st, 1907, there was much discussion between Alexander Graham Bell and his associates. The following is an excerpt from the September 11th, 1907, Home Notes, Volume 51:

"Ideas concerning organization of association. Dictation by AGB taken by FWB.

The idea which is gradually developing in my mind concerning the details of an organization is the members shall form a council of experts who shall meet together & discuss ideas concerning aerial locomotion & discuss

what is being done elsewhere in the world upon this subject and decide that certain apparatus or experiments should be made at the expense of the association. Mr. Baldwin may have some idea he wishes to have tested and so with the others – quite independent of joint work. If the council should vote that these ideas should be tested practically then Mr. Curtiss as director of experiments, acting through the superintendent of the laboratory, should provide the men & material ... The workmen take their instructions from the sup. of the laboratory, the sup. takes his instructions from the director of experiments & the director of experiments takes his instructions from the council or association of which he is a member.

The members of the council or association should have specific duties assigned to them (some of them at all events – I am not so sure about myself).

Lieut. Selfridge as secretary of the association should keep the records of the meetings ... and make it his duty to see that the literature of the world relating to aerial locomotion is rendered accessible to the members so that all might have the opportunity of studying what has been done elsewhere...

Douglas McCurdy in addition to acting as treasurer of the association & rendering financial reports from time to time might be assigned the special duty of keeping photographic records of apparatus and experiments ... it should also be his duty to make calculations for the association & generally to verify weights & measures & calculations & act as assistant engineer. Mr. Baldwin should be recognized as engineer in chief in charge of theoretical construction to see that all structures made should be designed on sound engineering lines. He should also have charge of drawings, plans, and design for structures and the engineering drawings made by him should be placed on file in the engineers office...

Mr. Curtiss should be recognized as the chief executive officer of the association ... and also have special charge of motive power, the designing of engines, propellers and their accessories consulting with the engineer in chief regarding structures to the strains produced by their operation ...

A.G. Bell to act as general advisor to the association without specific duties assigned. To preside at the meetings as permanent chairman & in his absence the members present to appoint a temporary chairman."

Among the day's events is an assembly of Grade 6 students from across the Island at Baddeck Academy to enjoy a talk by Roberta Bondar, Canada's first female astronaut and a talk by A.G. Bell's great grandson Hugh Muller followed by a fly past of three CF 18s. We are hosting an Open House from 2-4 pm and CBC Mainstreet is broadcasting from here from 4 - 6 pm.

Judith Tulloch's new book *The Aerial Experiment Association, Aviation Pioneers* will be launched during our

Open House. There is a 'by invitation' evening event as well.
